SPEAKER'S CORNER 18th August

On a sunny but chilly afternoon more than 50 people were enthralled by three presentations from our own village resident, Roy Spraakman. He shared photos and videos from Anilao in the Philippines where he dives up to 30m underwater, Point Lowly near Whyalla where he photographed the Giant Australian Cuttlefish and Edithburgh where his photographs of the formerly colourful sponges & coral that have died likely due to the toxic algal bloom.

Roy is a skilled photographer whose knowledge & passion about his subjects is clear. His presentations were captivating. Imagine tiny creatures only a few mm long shown on the large screen in all their beauty & unusual forms. The word I heard most often from the audience was ... "Amazing!"

If you missed Roy's presentation and would like to see it or share it with family or friends, he has generously said that he is happy to provide it on a USB. LOOKING AHEAD:


As the weather warms up in October, we bring you two social events, and booking sheets for both of them will be in the committee room from 26th September:

South Road Major Construction Updates

Also known as the T2D Project, this will bring big changes to our neighbourhood for the next 6 years. Staying informed may help you feel calmer about it or maybe, like me, you're just curious about things going on in your world.



When completed "drivers will be able to bypass 21 sets of traffic lights between the River Torrens and Darlington as they travel through two separate tunnels, connected by an open motorway." https://www.t2d.sa.gov.au/

The project manager states they will maintain "two lanes of traffic in each direction on South Road, noting that there may be occasional limited closures at night or other off-peak times for construction activities. The majority of construction will be undertaken offsite and next to South Road, which will limit impacts to existing traffic. New Variable Message Signs (VMS) will be installed at key locations to advise motorists of traffic conditions along and around South Road with real-time information." *Facebook post T2DProject*

"The T2D Project is South Australia's biggest-ever road project, and we are committed to keeping you informed. There are three easy ways for you to stay up-to-date on the project and construction activities. Get the latest construction notifications in your inbox or delivered by mail. We typically update the community once per week, as well as provide quarterly progress updates."
