KITCHEN EQUIPMENT JANUARY 2026

Once a year the Catering team empties the kitchen drawers and cupboards, clean the shelves and audits the items. This year we have made even larger signs for the drawers and cupboards than before, so I am hoping everyone is able to return all items to their correct position!!

Every year we seem to have “donations”! Please contact me before “donating” something you no longer need in your home.

All the stained mugs have been cleaned again. If you use a mug, please make sure you wash it up properly and return it to the drawer **CLEAN**. Last year we had **110** mugs – this year we only have **76**! If you had a function at home and have borrowed the mugs please return them as a matter of urgency. Some mugs may have broken since the last count – **BUT NOT 34??**

As usual, forks **(13)**, spoons **(10)** and tea spoons **(24)** have gone missing. Please check your cutlery drawers and return those you have.

New Automated External Defibrillator Rules/First Aid Kits

Automated External Defibrillator (AED) laws have changed in South Australia. From 1 January 2026, the Automated External Defibrillators (Public Access) Act 2022 (the Act) requires certain public buildings, facilities, and vehicles in South Australia to have at least one AED installed and registered.

This legislation includes Retirement establishments, such as ours, to have one in place, which we do (and have had for some time) – it is in the Community Centre, adjacent to the office door. There was some talk that this should be located on the outside of the building, but after consultation with Lee-Anne, we both agree that it is in the correct location i.e. we have control if it is inside. Of course, out of hours, a fob will be needed to gain access, so this is no change. You will no doubt have seen the temporary sign on the door outside the Community Centre.

Further to this, if the premises have a Swimming Pool to which the public has access, such as ours, an AED must be installed there too. As you are all aware, a Resident **must** be present at all times when any guest or family member (i.e. a member of the public) is using the Pool. The AED for the Pool is actually sited within the gymnasium and is visible through the glass door and window. The reason for this is to prevent any condensation entering the unit and potentially make it malfunction. It has been sited there for quite a while, so all the Pool users are aware of the location. Further to this, there is a sign at the top of each set of Pool steps indicating which way to go to collect the AED if it is needed.

Although the AED's have a low battery indicator light, Lee-Anne assures me that they are now checked twice a year too.

At the same time as this, Lee-Anne also advises that the First Aid Kits in the Community Centre are now checked bi-annually too in order to maintain them to a National Standard. If you need to use the kits and find they are depleted, please let Lee-Anne or me know in her absence.

Waterproof Wrist Fobs

Some of you may recall a tragic incident in one of our sister Villages a few years ago, when a solo late evening swimmer was found unresponsive the following morning in the Pool and had sadly passed away. That Village and one other now have Waterproof Fobs located on a board beside the Pool steps for wearing when alone in the water. I have requested that we too are supplied with Fobs and anticipate a response soonest.

Pool Lights

For information, I have now found the Pool lights have been left on overnight on at least 4 occasions when I attend for my early morning swim. I was able to deal with one of them but am unable to establish who was responsible on the other occasions. No doubt they were left on accidentally, but as Communal Electricity is one of our major costs, every little thing we can do to help will keep our Maintenance Budget increases to a minimum.

Garden Watering

Another old chestnut! If you are going to water your garden, we ask that you please, please try and do it before the sun comes up, or after the sun goes down, as during the heat of the day, much of it evaporates instead of soaking in! I have noticed during my Village walks, that there are still a couple of hose pipes around that do not have a squeeze trigger. This is a SA Water requirement! Furthermore, please don't leave hoses left running unattended! Did you know that the average garden hose uses 25 litres of water per minute and if you were to run it for 1 hour, this equates to approximately 1500 litres!!!

Any water running down the road is wasted and an additional cost to us too. There should be no need to water your lawns, as the sprinklers do this for you. If you note that there is an issue with one of your sprinklers (i.e. it is not working or is watering the road or footpath instead of your garden), please notify Lee-Anne in the first instance. In her absence, please give Garry (U84) a call. As you know, the water costs are borne by us all and currently amounts to almost \$80 thousand per year!
