

SPEAKER'S CORNER

3rd Monday of the month from 2 – 3 pm Now Co-ordinated by **Judy Burke** and **Kathy Simpson**

On 15 September more than 40 people enjoyed hearing about Deidre Fischer's adventures living and teaching internationally. Deidre's parents are Joan and Graham Fischer (unit 50). She was born and raised in Pinnaroo, South Australia and began her career teaching typing and shorthand, then other business subjects as well as economics in South Australian country schools. Some of her experiences were humorous but challenging. For example, once she was hired to teach typing in an SA school, only to find that the room was full of computers, not typewriters. She said she knew nothing about computers. The principal replied that she had 6 weeks over the school holidays to learn about them! In 1998, she ventured overseas to teach in the Philippines. Since then, she has lived and worked in China, Denmark, Saudi Arabia, Mongolia, Philippines (twice), Malaysia and Bali. In each case, she was working in an International Baccalaureate school (IB). She explained that IB is a different way of teaching and learning. They "aim to develop inquiring, knowledgeable and caring young people who are motivated to succeed." There are 6000 IB schools around the world, but they all use English for instruction and have a second language depending on the location. After several promotions, she finished up her career as Head of School.

Deidre shared some of the adventures she had in countries with varying climates and customs. She took her students on a trip to the rubbish tip to learn about the poorest people who lived there. The IB schools also had a program that provided food for those families to encourage them to send the children to school and to use the medical facilities that the IB set up near where they live. While many students are from embassy and wealthy families, the IB does offer scholarships for local students.



In 2014, Deidre established her own company, DF Education (www.deidrefischer.com.au) which provides a range of services to schools and works with parents, students and others involved with schools. Her mission is to positively impact student learning for those she works with in schools. It was a lovely experience to hear about a life spent serving students in so many places.



The Life of a Spy

In this presentation, Rod will tell his remarkable story of how he became one of Australia's top intelligence officers. He will tell of his time working with British intelligence agencies in London, his assignment to warravaged Somalia and his role in uncovering a secret biological weapons program in Iraq. At times he also worked with, and for, the CIA (USA). He had guns pointed at him, death threats made and even had a price placed on his head. This talk promises to be an entertaining event and will be illustrated with photos.

Rod Barton is a former Director of Strategic Technology in Australia's Defence Intelligence Organisation. He is the author of *The Weapons Detective: The Inside Story of Australia's Top Weapons Inspector* (Black Inc 2006) and

No need to drive, wait for taxi's or pay for extravagant meals. See in the New Year with fellow Villagers.


