#### Words.

We have questioned elements of the letter but, more so we have questioned the minutes we all received. The minutes didn't accurately record what happened at the meeting. By again using the words of the Act we have asked Lisa for an accurate record of the proceedings of the meeting.

In today's world we need to be careful with our words. We often see people threatening litigation as a means of defending or camouflaging their own actions. So, we need to choose our words carefully in public, when talking about or especially when criticising somebody.

We all know there are words that are far stronger than the word dislike. If you think of it, because the word dislike is softer, it is already opening the door to dissolving the issue surrounding the need to use a negative word.

On the other hand, if we choose positive words the impact of those words is reflected immediately, via a smile or hug. The impact of those words may not be seen immediately, rather down the track you may come across somebody whose life took a very different turn because of your words of encouragement. Words of kindness are equally as important as acts of kindness, which I've referred to previously.

Positive words are always best.

Tea & coffee & biscuits. Convenor Kathy Gillespie. No Fire Engines will attend.


Sunday 7th December 5:30 for 6:00pm. Christmas Dinner in the Community Hall.
