

At The Elms Residents'AGM held 12th June, the Motion to pay the SARVRA Membership fee for all Units for 2025-2026 was, once again, approved. This means you all have access to avail yourselves of all benefits of being a SARVRA Member. If we don't already have your email address, please provide us with it so you will have the ability to sign on to the Website (www.sarvra.asn.au) as a member and also to receive the Newsletter (and any current info) directly, as this is the only way SARVRA will communicate now. Those without an email address will be supported by copies printed and left in the Eastern and Western Halls. SARVRA also now has a direct phone number - 0415 311 501.

On Monday 18th August SARVRA held it's AGM in Adelaide. The meeting was well attended and much appreciated by all in attendance. Minutes of this AGM are now available online and in both Eastern and Western Halls.

The new SARVRA committee was confirmed and the two speakers, Rebekah Sharkie, federal Member for Mayo and Miranda Starkie, CEO for Council for the Ageing (COTASA), both gave very informative and inspiring talks.

Miranda stated that there were 3 key areas for the next 12 months:

- 1. Hold the government accountable heading into the next election.
- 2. Peruse getting free Ambulance for Pensioners.
- 3. Expanding availability of PATS (Patient Assistance Travel Scheme) for regional areas.

Rebekah was a very passionate speaker with regards to the contracts that we, as Retirement Village residents, sign - concerned that they are long and complex, present a power imbalance and there is no real oversight or accountability for our contracts. She is working at both the State and Federal level to get these contracts addressed.

At the moment contracts are in limbo - not a Real Estate nor a Financial transaction - suggesting that perhaps they should be considered as a Financial product and come under ASIC oversight. Watch this space!!!!

Both speakers are very happy to receive input (both good and bad) from we the residents.





Whilst at the AGM we received the news that the Retirement Villages Miscellaneous (Amendments) Act 2024 had been proclaimed and comes into operation on 2nd February, 2026.

Section 43(3) of the Act (Code of Conduct) is still being finalized, and comes into operation on 5th December 2026.

Given all the above, there will be a SARVRA Information Meeting at The Elms on TUESDAY OCTOBER 7th, 2025 at 2pm (with afternoon tea, \$3, thanks to our Entertainment Committee).

Representatives from SARVRA and either Office for Ageing Well (OFAW) or Council for the Ageing(COTA) will address us, followed by Q & A.


